The goal of the Kansas Green Schools Program is to provide opportunities for preK-12 schools to increase awareness and understanding of the complex environmental interrelationships that impact public health and the environment, and promote environmental stewardship practices that relate to air quality, climate change, solid waste reduction and recycling, water management, and outdoor wildlife habitat.

Green School Grant Funds Still Available

Grants of up to \$4,500 per school are still available for waste management, water quality, and air quality projects, field trips, and professional development for teachers. **Waste management grants have a deadline of 15 April.** Air and water quality grants do not have specific deadlines, but please apply soon so grants can be reviewed and processed by the end of the school year. Small grant funding (up to \$5,000) is available for preK-12 student water-related information and education to assist WRAPS (Watershed Restoration and Protection Strategy) initiatives. Examples of eligible programs and projects include but are not limited to water celebrations, environmental field experiences, workshops, educational tours/field days, Ag in the Classroom, brochures or newsletters, etc. Deadline is 15 July 2009.
